

110 Bridge St., William Means House, Greek Revival, 1816.
Occupied continuously for 129 years by the Means family. Architectural features: Fluted tonic porch and entrance columns; swag and garland carved window head; color glass window.



100 River St. (now Merrill Pkwy). Canal House, early 1800's.

200 Chestnut St. Gingerbread House Gingerbread Victorian, mid 1800's.




